**Series: Good News of Great Joy**

2. Share a glory sighting. Where have you experienced God's presence, seen God at work, or felt a "thin space" where you saw through to the glory of the Kingdom?
3. What can you look back and thank God for?
4. What are you looking forward to in confidence, faith, and hope?
5. How can this group help you expect to experience God, receive gifts with joy, and share the good news this Advent?

### Going Deeper:

*Contemplate the image below entitled "Mary and Eve" by Sr. Grace Remington, OCSO, of the Cistercian Sisters of the Mississippi Abbey.*



- What do you notice about this drawing? From types of fruit to how each woman is depicted emotionally and physically- what stands out to you?
- What significance is there that this meeting seems to take place in a garden?
- Why do you think Mary is crushing the serpent wrapped around Eve's feet? What does the serpent represent for both women?
- How could this drawing capture the both/and or the "in-between" nature of the kingdom we find ourselves in? [maybe we like Eve get tripped up by sin, but Christ, the fruit of Mary's womb, remains our hope.]
